
B-cell Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma

Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma (NHL) is a type of cancer that starts in a part of your immune system called the lymphatic system. The lymphatic system makes **white blood cells** (lymphocytes), which help protect you from diseases. B cells are a type of white blood cell. In B-cell NHL, **B cells** in your body begin to grow and act abnormally.

Some B-cell NHL subtypes include:

- Diffuse Large B-cell Lymphoma (DLBCL)
 - Primary Mediastinal B-cell Lymphoma (PMBCL)
- Follicular Lymphoma (FL)
- Mantle Cell Lymphoma (MCL)



Treatments for B-cell NHL

There are many treatment options that could be available to you now, or in the future if you need them. You can work with your healthcare team to see what is best for you and your goals.



Bispecific antibodies Use drugs to bring your cancerfighting immune cells closer to cancer cells (also a type of immunotherapy)



CAR T-cell therapy Adapt T cells from your immune system to fight cancer (also a type of immunotherapy)



Chemotherapy Use drugs to kill cells in the body, including cancer




Immunotherapy

Use drugs to help your immune system fight cancer



Radiation therapy Use focused radiation





Stem cell transplant

Use a transplant of cells to replace stem cells destroyed by a high-dose cancer treatment

Targeted therapy

Use drugs that target and fight specific types of cancer cells

Questions to ask my healthcare team

Tell your healthcare team about your treatment goals and expectations, and ask whatever is on your mind. If you think of any important questions before an appointment, write them down and bring them with you.

- Which treatment(s) will I be getting?
 How can I plan or prepare for treatment?
 What's involved? How often will I have treatment?
 What other treatments might be available to me if I need them in the future?
- Who or where can I turn to for support?
